Taming the Internet: Keeping Track of Online Passcodes

We manage, on average, more than two dozen accounts and passcodes, according to the credit scoring firm Experian. Documenting and updating usernames and passcodes in one secure place will make managing information easier and will save you time.

According to the Pew Research Center, 61 percent of Internet users in the United States bank online, 72 percent use social media, and 80 percent have shopped online. Those accounts make up your digital assets and include email accounts, social media, digital photos, music, movies, and e-books you've purchased.

Most of us immediately click "agree" when faced with terms of usage agreements, and with most online agreements, you will find that upon death, account rights cease and the account is not transferrable.

A *Wall Street Journal* story from 2013 titled "Life and Death Online: Who Controls a Digital Legacy?" brings light to this complicated issue. In this case, parents were unable to get access to their deceased 16-year-old daughter's online pictures and poetry. Most parents are unaware that they don't have rights to access their minors' accounts. The user agreements state that as a user, you agree to the conditions that the provider has defined.

We recommend that those of you with children under 18 have them document their usernames and passcodes. While my youngest and I sat together to set up her accounts so I could record her usernames and passcodes, I asked my son to just document and store his in a sealed envelope that I hope I never have to open.

Today, with many people using "the cloud" to store personal documents and photographs, it's even more important that you make available the keys to access these accounts with family and loved ones. Some of the most crucial data to record include your usernames, passcodes, PINs, and security questions.

Online access goes beyond email and social media. From your health insurance provider and online banking to your utility accounts, you will find that you can document those access codes with each of those records within this workbook.

To learn about creating secure passcodes, you should read AARP's *Protecting Yourself Online for Dummies* by Nancy Muir and Ryan Williams.

In addition to listing pertinent websites, URLs, usernames, passcodes, PINs, and security questions and answers, you should also list any linked credit cards. If a credit card is lost, compromised, or expires, you have an easy way to update payment methods for those accounts.

Are Online Assets Safe?

In August 2014, the *New York Times* reported that a Russian crime ring had stolen over 1.2 billion username and passcode combos and more than 500 million email addresses from some 420,000 websites. Add to that the increasing number of data breaches recently (Target, Michaels, and Nordstrom to name just a few), you should be wary of putting any of your sensitive personal information in a cloud-based storage application without at least encrypting the file first. The encryption, however, may make it impossible for even you to retrieve. If you want to store this information digitally, my recommendation is to store your personal accounts, papers, and details on a removable storage device—and keep it in a secure location.

Why Online Access Is Essential

Online access saved me hours of time when I needed to step in and manage my parents' affairs. Even mundane situations can arise that would require you to know the basics of your accounts. For example, if your spouse or partner were unavailable, would you be able to make changes to your mobile account or request service for an item under warranty? Many of these accounts include PINs or security questions.

Documenting the PINs, passcodes, and even security questions is essential so that your partner could use them to manage your shared lives, even if for only a temporary basis.

According to the FBI, the average burglar spends between eight and twelve minutes in your home and is looking for items that are easy to sell at a pawn shop such as electronics, gold, guns, jewelry, and silver, not a list of accounts and passcodes. You need to find the solution that will work for you and your loved ones.



Frequently Asked Questions about Online Passcodes and Access

Q: All my passcodes are stored in a passcode app on my phone. Do I still need to document them?

A: Absolutely. Unfortunately, if you are unable to access your passcode keeper, no one will be able to access your accounts. Most “user agreements” preclude others from getting access to your account. The only real way to ensure this information is shared is for you to document it. Some apps allow you to set up access for others as well as print out a cheat sheet. Find out if your app has these features and include a copy with your completed workbook.

Q: I have read that you should never write down your passcodes. Why are you suggesting I document them?

A: Most of the guidance you receive relates to professionals employed within a business. At home, you don't have an IT department that can override and reset your passcodes. I have yet to hear of a thief entering a home and stealing a list of passcodes, but I have heard stories of sorrow over lost pictures and emails as well as frustration over a Facebook or LinkedIn profile that survives past the life of a loved one. For those reasons, I urge you to consider documenting your passcodes.

Remember, I'm not suggesting you walk around with the passcodes in your wallet. The sheet should be kept in a safe place in your home where your loved ones can get to it if necessary.

Q: My estate planning included the designation for a “digital executor,” who I understand will provide the legal rights to access my accounts. Is it OK for me to skip this step?

A: Having a “digital executor” is becoming more popular, but most of the online services and account access you have established are governed by the “user terms and agreement” you accepted. If you took the time to read them, you would find that most of the services do not allow you to share access or grant rights to your access to someone else. For this reason, we recommend you write passcodes down.

Q: My passcodes change all the time—how am I supposed to keep up with them?

A: Exactly! This is a major challenge for us all. Once you document your usernames and passcodes, you will find that they really don't change that frequently—unless you are constantly resetting them because you forgot the original passcode. I keep a printout of my list next to my computer, and with more than 80 online accounts and passcodes, I refer to it frequently.

There are several apps that can store your passcodes. I have tried *Password Manager* and *Dashlane*; both require a passcode to access the information so it will only be useful to those who know you use it and who know your login passcode. I recommend you document your most important passcodes in writing because the requirement of a passcode may prove to be a barrier to those you are expecting to step in and assist you. I found having a written list next to my workspace was faster than trying to look up access codes online. I hope you find the solution that works best for you.
